Prolonged exposure in close proximity to someone with COVID-19 puts people at high risk of catching the disease, even if they've had both the disease and vaccinations against it, a study shows.

The study, published this month in Nature Communications, reveals that



the greater a person's exposure to SARS-CoV-2, the more vulnerable they are to infection, regardless of their vaccination status. This relationship has long been suspected, but the study is one of the first to document it.

The findings point to the importance of masking, improved ventilation and other measures that reduce exposure to the virus, says Akiko Iwasaki, an immunobiologist at Yale University in New Haven, Connecticut, who was not part of the study.

The finding "just makes intuitive sense," she says. "But now there's evidence that these [measures] are probably going to be important to help the vaccine-mediated immunity work for you."

Scientists have speculated since the start of the pandemic that the likelihood of SARS-CoV-2 infection correlates with the amount of virus that a person is exposed to. But verifying this relationship has been difficult because of the challenges in quantifying how much time people spend in close contact with others, and in tracking infections after such contact.

To procure such data, the study's authors turned to 13 correctional facilities in Connecticut that regularly conducted SARS-CoV-2 tests on residents without symptoms. The researchers assigned 'close exposure' status to anyone who shared a cell with an infected person, and 'moderate' exposure status to those who shared a cell block but not a cell with an infected resident. Those who lived in separate cell blocks from anyone known to be infected were designated as having no documented exposure.

"The design is very powerful," says Jose-Luis Jimenez, an aerosol scientist at the University of Colorado, Boulder. "That is the one situation in which you can straight-up control how people move and where people are. That eliminates one of the things that make this type of study difficult."

The authors' analysis of more than 10,000 residents and hundreds of SARS-CoV-2 infections found that vaccination, previous infection or both of those protected residents with no documented exposure to the virus, or with only moderate exposure. But neither vaccination, nor previous infection nor the two combined offered significant protection to those with a close exposure, says Margaret Lind, an **epidemiologist** at Yale University in New Haven, Connecticut, and a co-author of the study.

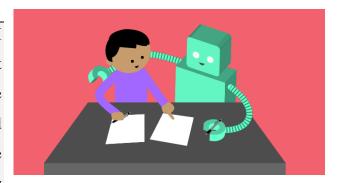

Reading 2

OpenAI wants its conversational AI agent ChatGPT everywhere, and includes classrooms — despite the immense potential for misuse confusion there. Taking the bull by the horns, the company has proposed a few



ways for teachers to put the system to use... outside its usual role as "research assistant" for procrastinating students.

The chatbot is controversial due to the dubious use case of unknown prevalence: plagiarism. Teachers around the world have caught or suspected students of having their essays written by ChatGPT, or using it to answer things like take-home quizzes. Depending on your opinion on educational methods this may be considered cheating, fair play, or something in between, but it is definitely throwing a wrench into lesson plans around the world.

Clearly OpenAI wants to rehabilitate the system's image a bit when it comes to education, so it has offered up a selection of, honestly, pretty compelling ways to put it to work in the classroom.

For instance, ChatGPT can be used to help language (especially English) learners to translate and write clearly and correctly. The system may not always get its facts right, but thanks to a corpus of largely correct writing, it is grammatically correct even while hallucinating. I've heard this before from people who aren't native speakers of English and there's no reason to think it wouldn't be as useful to a 5th grader as it is to an adult.

OpenAI also repeats experts saying (it is careful to put this in the context of educators making these suggestions themselves) that it could be helpful for formulating new test questions or role-playing as a job interviewer.

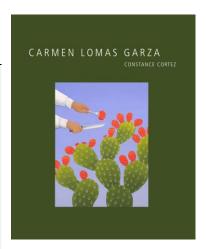

Camen Lomas Garza's eloquent etchings, lithographs, and gouache paintings depict primal images of the rural environment and communal cultural experience of Mexican descended people in the United States. In an introspective and personal language, she describes the customs, traditions, and way of life of her Texan - Mexican heritage.



By 1972, Lomas Garza had evolved her distinctive *monitos*, paintings of stylized figures in culturally specific social environments. She transposes images and scenes from her past, combining cultural documentation with invention in an interplay of fact and fiction. Through selection. emphasis, and creation, these *monitos* delineate facets of experience, expressing deeper truths.

Oral tradition is a mainstay of Chicano culture. In both urban and rural communities, a rich and varied repertoire of ballads, tales, and poetic forms is preserved in memory-and passed from generation to generation. Lomas Garza's *monitos* function as an oral tradition in visual form. Her unique art of storytelling employs iconographic elements to create a concentrated narration. Visual episodes within an unfolding epic tale of cultural regeneration, the monitos keep alive the customs and daily practices that give meaning and coherence to Chicano identity. **Their** basic aim is to delight and instruct. For those outside Chicano culture, the precise and minutely detailed *monitos* provide a glimpse into the rich and vibrant lifestyle of the largest Spanish speaking cultural group within United States society.

Although her art has an innocent earnestness and folkloric affinity. Lomas Garza's expression is neither naive nor instinctive. The artist is highly trained academically, but has chosen to remain independent of dominant artistic trends in order to work toward a

private aesthetic response to social concerns. While her work does not posit an overt political statement. it originates from a desire to respond to the contemporary situation of Mexican Americans by expressing positive images of their culture.
