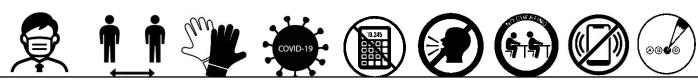

Reading 1

What factors contribute the most to PhD satisfaction? Stipends that are more than just a living wage? Manageable, if not predictable, hours? A collegial and mutually supportive team? These all matter, and are often in short supply. Another factor, which is often overlooked, is supportive supervision.



The message that supervisors who make a conscious effort to support and mentor their PhD candidates have more-satisfied students comes from *Nature*'s 2025 global survey of more than 3,700 doctoral students. About half of the respondents, who self-reported their experiences, said that their supervisors spent less than one hour a week with them. Some 69% of respondents in this group reported being at least moderately satisfied with their PhD compared with around 82% of those who met with their supervisors more often. These results chime with studies showing how PhD student well-being is connected to their supervision. And they indicate that people responsible for running research systems in some countries represented by the survey responses are missing an opportunity.

In the United Kingdom and Germany, for example, 61% and 60% of respondents, respectively, see their supervisors for less than one hour a week. By contrast, in India, 60% spent at least one hour a week with their supervisor. Some of the most satisfied respondents of this year's survey studied in Brazil (83%) and Australia (82%), where nearly half of students were extremely happy with their overall relationship with their supervisor, compared with 36% of students globally. Doctoral students in both of these countries described relationships marked by openness and mutual respect, and supervisors were seen as collaborators rather than distant evaluators.

The student experiences in Brazil and Australia show how extra attention can lift both morale and performance. Not losing promising researchers to burnout and disillusionment should be sufficient incentive for supervisors to adopt a more hands-on approach. And supervisors can benefit, too. A 2019 report from the US National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine report on mentorship in science notes that researchers who invest time in their students tend to lead more-productive, more-collaborative groups and attract

stronger future students than those who do not. Other studies, notably a 2022 review on the quality of academic mentoring, describe how supervisors who engage closely with their students can benefit by learning new techniques and discovering emerging fields, and say that **they** often feel intellectually recharged. *Nature*'s survey also brings into sharp focus a related, but altogether darker, side of supervision: bullying and harassment. About 43% of respondents had experienced some form of discrimination or harassment, most commonly bullying or general mistreatment. Worryingly, in around four out of ten bullying cases, a student reported bullying by their supervisor. Only 28% of these respondents felt able to report

bullying by their supervisor. Only 28% of these respondents felt able to report such behaviour without fear of **reprisal**.

Reading 2



Nelson Rolihlahla Mandela was a South African antiapartheid activist and politician who was the first president of South Africa from 1994 to 1999. He was the country's first Black head of state and the first elected in a fully representative democratic election. His administration focused on dismantling the legacy of apartheid by fostering racial reconciliation and a multiracial democracy. Ideologically an African nationalist and socialist, he served as the president of the African National Congress (ANC) party from 1991 to

1997.

A Xhosa, Mandela was born into the Thembu royal family in Mvezo, South Africa. He studied law at the University of Fort Hare and the University of Witwatersrand before working as a lawyer in Johannesburg. There he became involved in anti-colonial and African nationalist politics, joining the ANC in 1943 and co-founding its Youth League in 1944. After the National Party's white-only government established apartheid, a system of racial segregation that privileged whites, Mandela and the ANC committed themselves to its overthrow. He was appointed president of the ANC's Transvaal branch, rising to **prominence** for his involvement in the 1952 Defiance Campaign and the 1955 Congress of the People. He was repeatedly arrested for seditious activities and was unsuccessfully prosecuted in the 1956 Treason Trial. Influenced by Marxism, he secretly joined the banned South African Communist Party (SACP). Although initially committed to non-violent protest, in association with the SACP he co-founded the militant uMkhonto we Sizwe in 1961 that led a sabotage campaign against the apartheid government. He was arrested and imprisoned in 1962, and, following the Rivonia Trial, was sentenced to life imprisonment for conspiring to overthrow the state.

Mandela served 27 years in prison, split between Robben Island, Pollsmoor Prison, and Victor Verster Prison. Amid growing domestic and international pressure and fears of racial civil war, President F. W. de Klerk released him in 1990. Mandela and de Klerk led

efforts to negotiate an end to apartheid, which resulted in the 1994 multiracial general election in which Mandela led the ANC to victory and became president. Leading a broad coalition government which promulgated a new constitution, Mandela emphasised reconciliation between the country's racial groups and created the Truth and Reconciliation Commission to investigate past human rights abuses. Economically, his administration retained its predecessor's liberal framework despite his own socialist beliefs, also introducing measures to encourage land reform, combat poverty and expand healthcare services. Internationally, Mandela acted as mediator in the Pan Am Flight 103 bombing trial and served as secretary-general of the Non-Aligned Movement from 1998 to 1999. He declined a second presidential term and was succeeded by his deputy, Thabo Mbeki. Mandela became an elder statesman and focused on combating poverty and HIV/AIDS through the charitable Nelson Mandela Foundation.

Reading 3

Around 75 million years ago, North America's largest and most <u>formidable</u> carnivore was not a dinosaur—but a croc. *Deinosuchus*, the "terrible crocodile" in Greek, could reach more than 35 feet in length and weigh over five tons. Bite marks on bones leave no doubt that the immense reptile caught and ate dinosaurs. How *Deinosuchus* became such a large and widespread predator, however, has been a



mystery. Now, a new study published today in *Communications Biology* claims to have solved the puzzle—by shifting where *Deinosuchus* fits in the croc family tree and, potentially, how tolerant the reptiles were of salty habitats. "We wanted to better understand how *Deinosuchus* became this successful top predator of coastal wetlands all over North America, why it grew so large," says Márton Rabi, a paleontologist at the University of Tübingen in Germany and a coauthor on the paper.

Paleontologists have been on the trail of *Deinosuchus* since a pair of fossilized teeth were found in North Carolina in 1858. Since that time the reptile's fossilized teeth, bony armor, skull pieces, and skeletal parts have been found in Mexico, Utah, Texas, Montana, South Carolia, New Jersey, and more, popping up along the edges of North America's prehistoric coastlines in rocks 82 to 72 million years old. In the lowland marshes and swamps of Cretaceous North America, *Deinosuchus* watched and waited for prey to get close enough to bite.

Paleontologists categorized the three known *Deinosuchus* species as alligatoroids, the broad group that contains the American alligator and Chinese alligator today. The broad, rounded snout of *Deinosuchus* certainly carried a resemblance to alligators more than other crocodilians, the reptile group that includes both crocodiles, alligators, and their relatives, hinting at a close relationship.

After running a new comparison of family relationships, the researchers have questioned the traditional view and recategorized the massive reptile. Instead, the study suggests, *Deinosuchus* belonged to an ancient lineage that split off before the last common

ancestor of today's alligators and crocodiles, carrying characteristics that are seen in both groups. This allowed the ancient croc to thrive among saltier habitats like estuaries and ocean coasts like saltwater crocodiles do today.

"We were surprised to find out that *Deinosuchus* was not a 'greater alligator," Rabi says. The team argues that the reptile's alligator-like appearance was likely a matter of convergent evolution rather than a family resemblance.

New York Institute of Technology paleontologist Adam Cossette, who was not involved in the new study, questions some of the methodologies used to construct the new family tree but notes that the new placement makes sense as *Deinosuchus* fossils show an array of traits seen in alligators and crocodiles, as well as some features "usually found very deep

in the tree."
